



1-31 January Peter Coad



Born in 1947, Peter spent his first 10 years in the town of Karoonda. The vast landscape of the area has had a significant influence on his vision as an artist as his paintings reveal.

Peter's confident use of vivid colours make his paintings distinctive, powerful, full of vitality, individuality, and perception. They portray the different characteristics of the landscape with unique sensibility and reveal an underlying connection to the land. The amalgamation of detail plus free application of colour conveys his aim to depict what he sees and feels rather than portray an accurate translation of a particular place.

His influences come from being attracted to the ephemeral colours of morning and evening light causing the scenery to become intensely vibrant. Many of his paintings incorporate birds or creatures that he has encountered during his travels and these bring an emotive tranquillity to his work.

For over 40 years as a professional artist with 74 Solo Exhibitions and participation in numerous group showings in Australia and internationally in places such as Japan, U.S.A., Hong Kong, Malaysia, Singapore, and Spain, he has also found time to lecture on his work, be an advisor, curator, and judge of exhibitions in many of these places as well.

1-31 March Elizabeth Close



Elizabeth Close is an Anangu woman from the Pitjantjatjara and Yankunytjatjara Language Groups, whose family links are to the communities of Pukutja and Amata in the APY Lands. Elizabeth was born in Adelaide but grew up in outback SA, returning to Adelaide to complete her secondary schooling, and attend university to complete a Bachelor of Nursing.

In 2007, Elizabeth began to paint professionally and exhibit her work throughout Adelaide and her practice organically grew as she balanced nursing, art and motherhood. By 2014 she had built up a full-time arts practice, and after the birth of their second child, Elizabeth and her family relocated to the APY to reconnect with family, language and culture; something that is profoundly reflected in the evolution of her work.

Currently, Elizabeth is a mid-career, Aboriginal Visual Artist living and working on Unceded Kaurna Country. She has spent the past 16 years crafting a dynamic and bold multi-disciplinary arts practice that speaks to the politics of Aboriginality, her own personal Connection to Country and the concept of connection to place and space more broadly; more specifically, how it relates to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander relationships with the landscape and ways of being and knowing. She works primarily in the mediums of 2D arts, large scale public art and digital media, and thrives in experimentation and challenge.

Michael Carney



Michael Carney works from his studio in Kaurna Yerta/Adelaide where he works across disciplines as varied as painting, ceramics, 3d print, installation and virtual reality.

His paintings often depict distorted landscapes made up of symbols and compositional elements that offer many different pathways to the viewer. The work is derived from the notion that in the sublime romantic tradition that nature operates as a duality, demonstrating the ability to evoke both beauty and terror (often all at once).

Sometimes the work is a meditation on melancholy, other times it may have a cinematic neo-noir sensibility, but regardless of intension there is hope that each person's interpretation is unique.

Michael completed a Masters by Research (Visual Arts) at the University of South Australia in 2016. He has exhibited at various galleries throughout Australia as well as South Australian institutions such as SASA and CACSA. He spent 3 very influential months in Jingdezhen, China developing his ceramics practice. Following this residency was a two year ceramics associateship at the JamFactory. He now works out of his studio in Adelaide with a national exhibition practice.
